Proposed FY 2022 City of Berlin Budget Public Hearing – May 26, 2021

Mayor Grenier opened the duly scheduled and advertised public hearing at approximately 6:30 p.m. Present were Mayor Grenier, Councilors Otis, Eastman, Berthiaume, Rozek, Higbee, and Theberge. Also present: City Manager James Wheeler, Finance Director Holly Larsen, Danielle Rioux, Police Chief Peter Morency, Assistant Police Chief Daniel Buteau, Lt. Jeff Lemoine, Superintendent Julie King, Ann Nolin, Fire Chief James Watkins, Recreation Director Terry Letarte, Marcel Leveille, Tara MacKillop, Bronson Frizzell, Janet Tremblay, and Barbara Tetreault, Berlin Daily Sun.

Mayor Grenier thanks those in attendance for expressing an interest in the municipal budget. Mayor Grenier asked that if anyone wishes to speak, they do so at the podium, and be respectful of each other's time. Mayor Grenier advised that the budget is still a work in progress, and that Senator Hennessey has advised that there may still be some changes in the state budget that would add funds for education. As of now, the budget represents a tax increase of \$1.87, however the goal is to reduce that to \$0.60-\$0.70. They will need to find an additional \$480,000-\$500,000 to meet the goal.

City Manager Wheeler advised that they started the budget process early in the year with input from departments. The original budget proposed in March had a tax increase of \$8.29, however this included capital improvements that the Council needed to consider. After cuts to capital improvements and a surplus from the school department, the current tax rate increase in the budget presented tonight would be \$1.87. City Manager Wheeler advised that there were also some savings in salary items and health insurance costs, along with additional revenues from the American Recovery Plan.

Mayor Grenier read the Proposed FY2022 Budget into the record, and advised the public that they could comment on any section presented.

Mayor Grenier advised that the Mayor and City Council line also includes the audit, and that stipends for the Mayor and Council have remained unchanged since 1970. Mayor Grenier also advised that the IT Department line has increased due to ransomware attacks on municipalities, and the need for multiple backups for systems. City Manager Wheeler advised that Primex has made a big effort to prepare communities for this possibility and to protect their systems.

Mayor Grenier advised that the primary budget increase for the Police Department and Fire Department was in the cost for the NH Retirement System. Chief Morency agreed, stating that the cost for NHRS and health insurance accounted for most of the increase in the budget, and that the budget contains the same resources and services as the previous one did.

Janet Tremblay of 812 Second Avenue stated that she pays for her own retirement and does not believe that taxpayers should be paying to contribute to the retirement system for municipal employees.
