City Manager's Report

- 1. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) approved the Groundwater Management Permit for closed Cates Hills Landfill. The permit is issued for a period of 5 years to monitor groundwater quality and is a renewal of the Permit that expired on March 10, 2018.
- 2. On Friday, April 20th, the signing of Senate Bill 402, which names part of Route 110 after Tony Urban, took place at the State house.
- 3. There will be an online/virtual meeting with Spohn Ranch on Wednesday May 23rd at 6pm to look at review skate park design ideas. Advertising for the public event will start later this week. Public Works has been working on evaluating site conditions and we are working with Eversource to understand what they will and will not allow under their aerial easement area which overlays the southwestern corner of the property. The project is still on target to be built and completed late in summer or early fall.
- 4. The City's Fuel Oil contract is out for bid with bids due May 8th. This information can be considered in the final budget.
- 5. The Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the Route 16 Project will be held Friday, May 11th at the Service Credit Union Heritage Park at 11:00 a.m. Lunch will follow.
- 6. The Berlin Main Street Program will host the Downtown Day of Caring on Friday, May 18^{th.} Starting at 9:00 a.m. They are looking for volunteers to help rake, prune, sweep, mulch, weed, and plant their way through multiple sites in the downtown area. You can sign up to volunteer at berlinmainstreetprogram@gmail.com or calling 603-752-6246 or 603-381-1520.
- 7. EMS Study consultant interviews were held Friday, May 4th. A recommendation for a consultant will be made to Mayor and Council once the process is completed.
- 8. We have two tax deeded properties out for bids that are due May 15th. There are an additional four that will be out soon.
- 9. The two new pick-up trucks purchased for Public Works have been received.
- 10. Ethan Lopez of Boy Scout Troop 207 visited the Fire Station for a few hours to "work" with the firefighters. Ethan is working on his community Service Merit badge and the Fire Department was one of the places he chose to perform some of his hours. Ethan assisted with inventory, the Engine 2 weekly truck check as well as washing Engine 2.

- 11. DES will be holding a public hearing tomorrow, Tuesday, May 8th at 6:00 p.m. in the City Hall Auditorium regarding an expansion of the Mt. Carberry Landfill to add 710,000 cubic yards of capacity on top of the existing landfill. This expansion is projected to extend the facility's life expectancy by about 2.3 years.
- 12. The Stand Up Androscoggin Valley Coalition will host an event Tuesday, May 15th from 6-8 p.m. at the Medallion Opera House/Gorham Town Hal. It will focus on the legal consequences of substance misuse and some of the pathways to manage it. A flyer and agenda are attached.
- 13. Opportunity Zones encourage long-term investment in the areas in which they are located. Created by the Federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act last December, the program provides tax incentives for investors who reinvest unrealized capital gains into qualified Opportunity Zones. Berlin has been nominated by the Governor for a census tract east of NH Rte. 16. The nominations have been forwarded to the US Treasury Department which has 30 days to designate these tracts as Opportunity Zones. The future site of North Country Growers is within this tract.
- 14. Statistics from the Public Works, Fire and Police Departments are attached.
- 15. Also attached is a report from Fire Chief John Lacasse outlining some of his department's projects and accomplishments over recent weeks.

City Council Meeting Fire Department Report

- Engine 4 went down to Coastal Truck in Portsmouth today for the frame rail replacement.
- The City Seal has been added to the pick-up and the UTV trailer is set to receive its City Seal in the next week or so.
- The Department will be returning the Forestry Jeep in the next couple of weeks. The vehicle has been on loan to us from the Division of Forests and Lands since 1989. It was initially given to us to use for wildland fires but, became part of the Fire Department response equipment for the Haz-Mat team at the mill complex. Since the mill has closed and the Haz-Mat team is no more, the vehicle has mostly sat idle. With the addition of our UTV and ATV, along with the pick-up and the quick response by Forest and Lands it is no longer necessary. Since space is at a premium within the station it was decided that we will return it to the state.
- As some of you may know, the National Guard Armory will be decommissioned this year. In a conversation with some of our personnel, representatives at the Armory offered the Department lockers, desks, chairs, and some office supplies. As a result, the personnel were able to acquire new (to us) lockers for our gear, much needed desks and chairs for our training room, and a large amount of copy paper. We were able to offer some much needed chairs to the Recreation Department for their programs as a result.
- The washing machine that we use for our gear finally decided to give up after our last structure fire. We will be installing our new commercial gear washer in the next couple of weeks but, in the meantime, Captain Pat Tremblay was able to acquire a new washer from Lowes in Littleton (his sister works there) for a deep discount. Pat's Heating donated the rest of the money for the washer so, a special thank you goes out to him for that!!
- The Department was chosen late last year to take part in the Get Alarmed NH program to install smoke detectors in owner occupied single family homes in the City. Eligibility was for homeowner's with small children or homes with occupants 60 years of age and older. The program has been very successful and several hundred smoke detectors have been installed in Berlin. We recently received two more pallets of detectors and will be completing installations this spring.
- The men have also been working on creating a new fitness center in the department. They have cleaned out the old equipment and are working with the Trust on a grant for new equipment.
