Re: City Manager's Report

- Water Works trained Public Works on using hydrants for filling the street sweeper and sewer jet several week ago.
- 2. Work on Hutchins St. is progressing on schedule. There have been some reports that the work was stopped by the discovery of highly unsuitable materials. For the record, these reports are not true. Also, it has been determined that there will be a higher quantity of ledge excavation than originally calculated on a section of the project. Public Works will track the impact of this on the total project cost as the job moves forward.
- April Poirier was hired as the part time clerk at the Fire Department. Doris Fortier will be working as a
  nurse in the Health Department. Sue Whitehouse also started work for the summer as the
  Coordinator of the Inmate Work Program. We are getting an earlier start this year and there is a lot
  of work to do.
- 4. Bids are due Thursday June 9th for the demolition of 24 Birch Street and 339 Goebel Street.
- 5. There is also a bid out for construction of a fuel distribution system at the Public Works Garage.
- 6. In their Spring 2016 Newsletter, the Berlin & Coos County Historical Society has an article about the paving of Main Street. Berlin became the first community in NH to pave a city street by laying non-reinforced concrete in the downtown from Green Square to High Street in 1909. I've attached a copy of the article, 107 years later we will be removing section of this concrete in the reconstruction project.
- 7. The NH DOT sent us notice of the Final Inspection Meeting for the Route 110 Project. It will be held Thursday, June 9 at 10:00 a.m.

#### **Main Street Construction**

This summer, the city of Berlin will be doing the long overdue reconstruction of Main Street from the interection of High Street to Twelfth Street. This will include the replacement of infrastructure such as the storm drainage and water systems. From Twelfth Street to the Community College only the pavement surface will be replaced. Much of the demolition will be difficult because under the many layers of asphalt accumulated over the past 75 years is the original steel reinforced concrete pavement which was laid in 1910 up to Iceland Street (Fifth Street), and continued further north in 1922. The total cost of this project will be about 6.3 million dollars. In 1910 the cost of paving from High St. to Iceland St. was \$18,078.80.

Berlin became the first community in New Hampshire to pave a city street by laying non-reinforced concrete in the downtown area from Green Square to High Street in 1909. This was done because more mechanized vehicles were making their appearance, including trucks. These vehicles were much heavier than the horse and wagons and were tough on the macadam paved Main Street (gravel), creating ruts and lots of mud. Although not steel reinforced and laid on the existing ground material in 1909, the Main Street concrete surface endured into the 1920s and was eventually covered with asphalt. In the late 1970s the downtown infrastructure was replaced. During this massive construction project, the first concrete that was laid on a street in New Hampshire, buried under a foot of asphalt, was removed. In 1922, Berlin Public Works continued paving Berlin's city streets with priority given to the hills as these were the first to wash out during rain storms. Berlin was still growing in the twenties and did well to build its infrastructure along with its fast growth.


